Dr. Haack is a distinguished scholar who is included in P. J. King's *100 Philosophers: The Life and Work of the World's Greatest Thinkers* and on the *Sunday Independent's* list, based on a BBC poll, of the ten most important women philosophers of all time; her work has celebrated in a volume of essays entitled *Susan Haack: A Lady of Distinctions*; and in 2011 she was awarded the degree of Doctor Honoris Causa by Petre Andrei University (Romania). Her work ranges from philosophy of logic and language, epistemology, metaphysics, philosophy of science, Pragmatism—both philosophical and legal—and the law of evidence, especially scientific evidence, to social philosophy, feminism, and philosophy of literature. She has written numerous books including *Philosophy of Logics, Evidence and Inquiry, Deviant Logic, Fuzzy Logic: Beyond the Formalism, Fuzzy Logic, Manifesto of a Passionate Moderate, Defending Science - Within Reason, Pragmatism, Old and New, and Putting Philosophy to Work*. Dr. Haack has published numerous articles in professional philosophy journals, scientific publications, legal journals, and general interest magazines. Haack's work has been translated into a dozen languages, and she has lectured at universities and conferences in more than 25 countries around the world.

Dr. Haack has received numerous awards for Excellence in Teaching, for Outstanding Graduate Mentor, the Provost's Award for Research, and the Faculty Senate Distinguished Scholar Award. She is a honorary member of Phi Beta Kappa, and Phi Kappa Phi. She is a member of the Advisory Board of the Peirce Edition Project, and a past president of C. S. Peirce Society. She has been elected to the Institut International de Philosophie, and has served on the Advisory Boards of the Center of Advanced Studies at the University of Virginia, the Leverhulme Evidence Project, and the US/UK Educational Commission.
